The following narrative about how this school promotes and supports parental involvement was submitted by this school.

Highland School promotes open and positive communication with all parents. Every year the following programs are offered to parents: Open House, Parent-Teacher Conferences twice a year, Family Arts Night, and six "town meetings". Parents and children participated in our annual reading program called "Read for Seeds". All participants received seeds, pots and soil for spring time planting. A monthly newsletter is sent home to all parents informing them of upcoming events and ways to help their children at home. An additional newsletter is sent home monthly to all parents that focuses solely on helping children in school. The Highland Web Page is updated regularly and includes individual teacher pages. Highland School has a Parent Teacher Advisory Council. The council is composed equally of parents and teachers who advised the principal on issues such as curriculum, the budget, school facility issues and larger issues that may be impacting the district. With a very active PTO, parents are afforded multiple opportunities to volunteer within classrooms and at special school-wide events such as Field Day, the Holiday Store, Book Fairs and our annual Plant Sale. Community volunteers serve as mentors to students. Due to our close proximity to the high school, high school students can often be found reading to our younger students and serving as Big Brothers or Big Sisters.

EFFORTS TO REDUCE RACIAL, ETHNIC AND ECONOMIC ISOLATION

Below is the description submitted by this school of how it provides educational opportunities for its students to interact with students and teachers from diverse racial, ethnic, and economic backgrounds.

During the 2012-2013 academic year, Highland School completed its third year as a Kindergarten through grade 2 school. With our partner school, Yalesville, located a mile down the road the two schools participated in a variety of joint activities. Through the efforts of a very active PTO, Highland School students were able to participate in activities such as, the annual variety show and the drama club production of Annie! The Highland School PTO continues to support cultural events and activities. We continue to work with community members on the Highland Garden. Through generous donations many vegetables were planted and eaten during school lunch in this fall. Students and parents weeded and harvested vegetables during the summer. We were hosts to Chinese educators who spent the day visiting classrooms, meeting staff and experiencing an early childhood environment. Lastly, our K-Kids club of approximately 60 first and second grade students organized several fundraisers to support our community. We collected pet supplies for the local animal shelter, raised money for the July 4th town fireworks, collected food for the food drive and made Valentines cards for Veteran's.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLANS AND ACTIVITIES

The following narrative was submitted by this school.

Through PTAC or PTO, parents offer suggestions and take a vital interest in making school-wide programs better than the previous year. Teachers from all academic areas were provided the achievement results of our K-2 students as well as Connecticut Mastery Test results from our partner school. District-wide assessment data was shared during the course of the year since Highland will no longer participate in CMT testing. Highland School continues to work towards becoming a Professional Learning Community. Under the new SEED evaluation plan, both teachers and administrators are working on similar goals to address student achievement. District initiatives included the Common Core in language arts and mathematics. Teachers were working diligently implementing the standards. Time is allotted for classroom teachers and special area teachers to meet and discuss curriculum, review district assessment data, share findings/results at staff meetings. RTI (formerly known as EIP) is used by all classroom teachers to address academic and /or social concerns of students. The team is comprised of special education support staff and regular education teachers. The team develops interventions to address concerns.
