Department of Special Education Program Descriptions

The Integrated Preschool at Cook Hill:

The Integrated Preschool at Cook Hill is a specialized program which services children district wide between the ages of 3 to 5 years, who are not yet kindergarten eligible, and who have been deemed eligible for special education services. Special education is available to preschool children who have attained the age of three years and whose degree and type of disability, based on the evaluation by the Planning and Placement Team, is such that the absence of specialized instruction will impair the child's educational development to the extent that it is unlikely that the child will be able to make satisfactory educational progress when the child attains school age. Traditionally based on a "reverse maintaining model", the Integrated Preschool enrolls a number of non-disabled (regular education) students who serve as role models for the students with identified special needs. Teaching staff is required to be certified to teach special education at the Preschool level.

WISE Fritz/MYB Elementary: K-2

This program services special education students in grades K-2. The emotional/behavioral/mental health needs in the regular setting are so significant that there has been a documented negative impact on their education. The program provides a small, highly structured environment with a behavior modification program and token economy to help stabilize and change behaviors. There is also a full-time school social worker for all mental health and behavioral needs

WISE Fritz Elementary: 3-5 This program services special education students in grades 3-5. The emotional/behavioral/mental health needs in the regular setting are so significant that there has been a documented negative impact on their education. The program provides a small, highly structured environment with a behavior modification program and token economy to help stabilize and change behaviors. There is also a full-time school social worker for all mental health and behavioral needs.

S.T.A.R.S. (Succeed Together and Achieve with Responsive Support):

STARS is Wallingford Public Schools' specialized autism program supporting the needs of students with autism who exhibit significant concerns with language, behavioral and/or adaptive skills. This is an ABA (applied behavioral analysis) based program designed to support each individual students' needs, while systematically and explicitly increasing language, behavioral and/or adaptive skills. The STARS primary program for students in grades K-2 is housed at Stevens, and the elementary program for students in grades 3-5 is located at Pond Hill.

INSPIRE (Dag Hammarskjold Middle School and Lyman Hall High School):

INSPIRE is for students who need intensive supports to be successful in the public school setting. Students may be diagnosed with a variety of exceptionalities including autism, intellectual disability, or multiply handicapped. They typically work on their own individualized programs, one-to-one with a paraprofessional throughout their day. These students are primarily non-verbal and attend select encore and core classes. Staff make efforts to ensure that students attend classes with their grade level general education peers whenever possible. Students are accompanied by a para-educator for core social studies and science classes and in certain encores, based on student needs. They go on multiple field trips to learn how to shop efficiently and budget, run an Inspire Café two days weekly, and work on a supply replenishment list. Life skills and social skills are taught daily through both small group and "on the spot" training, with multiple opportunities for "re-dos" until they understand and master the skill. Real-life experiences help students to apply learned social skills and life skills in community settings.

STEP (District-wide 4-8):

Students are formally identified as intellectually gifted using the district criteria, which considers OLSAT scores, STAR testing, and teacher ratings using the Gifted Rating Scales. STEP provides enrichment and extension through project based activities in a homogeneous setting. The program is designed to challenge the students intellectually, provide a safe environment for risk taking, encourage students to develop their strengths and grow from their weaknesses. STEP classrooms are located in each of the 3-5 elementary schools and both middle schools.


Department of Pupil Personnel Service Program Descriptions


ARTS (Alternative Route to Success):

The mission of A.R.T.S. Academy is to provide an alternative approach to education that allows students to develop the academic, emotional and behavioral skills necessary to succeed independently in a traditional or non-traditional school environment. All aspects of the program are designed to teach students the skills necessary to be healthy, socially and academically productive individuals, to prepare them for transitioning back to their homeschool and to succeed in life beyond high school.

Independent Community & Employment Training Transition Program (ICE-T): The ICE-T program provides supported vocational experiences to students aged 18-21 in order to increase employment opportunities and further independence. ICE-T provides work experiences within the Wallingford community to enable students to develop job skills necessary for employment. These young adults learn to generalize appropriate attitudes and behaviors necessary for successful transitions into working environments. Students complete self-assessment activities & perform situational assessments in order to explore their likes, dislikes, strengths, weaknesses & aptitudes. They then engage in real life experiences that promote problem solving, high order thinking skills and strategies necessary for successful transition to adult life. Involvement in the ICE-T program allows students the opportunity to participate in experiences at job sites in the local community including by not limited to Staples, All Pets Club, Dollar Tree, Goodwill, Marshall's, Big Y, Primerica, East Center Market, Walgreens, Tech Allied, and Masters Manna.

Recent Updates and Ongoing Projects 2018-2019 Budget

During this budget year, the Buildings and Grounds Department was able to move forward on the construction phase of the four (4) school window replacement project and the four (4) school theater renovation project. The books are not yet closed on the Theater Project but the main body of work is complete and the schools are currently using the new equipment. We are still working on a few tweaks that will naturally come up with use in a project of this size. The Window Replacement Project has made great progress with Cook Hill and Parkers Farms down to a punch list. The work on the remaining two schools Lyman Hall and Highland will continue next summer with a fall completion date. In addition to these two major capital projects we continued to address needed repairs and emergencies and are in the process of removing and replacing numerous oil/gas tanks, currently Parker Farms, Sheehan Garage and the Maintenance Warehouse are all in process with more to be scheduled in the near future.

Current Priorities Included in the 2019-2020 School Year

This year we will be wrapping up construction work on the 4 school window project. Cook, Parker, and the LHHS student entrance have been completed with Highland and the remainder of LHHS to be completed this year. We will also be replacing several fuel oil tanks throughout the district along with a roof replacement project on the 1996 addition at Dag. We are also looking to conducting several small asbestos abatements that will eliminate quarterly monitoring and provide immediate savings to the district.

Long Term Needs 2020-2021 and Beyond

Our long-term goals and plans for future projects include several paving projects, gym floor replacement at multiple schools, ADA compliant lavatories and storage at the LHHS athletic complex and multiple roof replacements that did not qualify for our past roofing project. We are also constantly upgrading our building and energy management automation systems and evaluating future energy conservation projects.

Recent Updates and Ongoing Projects 2018-2019 Budget

Key to the implementation of personalized learning is technology. All classrooms have adequate A/V presentation equipment (projectors & SmartBoards) and all elementary classrooms have Interactive Touch-It TV's. All WPS teachers are issued a school laptop for instruction. We are a Google School district and Teachers will continue to be trained in Google Classroom and other interactive technologies. The goal is to leverage technology to engage students and increase the capacity and efficiency of instruction. At the middle schools we have 1:1 ratio of Chromebooks and students. High school ninth grade students were issued Chromebooks to begin a 1:1 Program. At the Elementary Schools, our students have access to iPads and Chromebooks. Each school is developing its own technology professional development to continue the implementation based on school staff readiness and capacity.

Current Priorities Included in the 2019-2020 School Year

In addition to funding the Computer Replacement Plan, continue funding for the 1:1 Chromebook program. Funding is requested for additional iPads for Elementary Schools, network hardware, Cable Access TV equipment and a voice mail system compatible with Google.

Long Term Needs 2020-2021 and Beyond

Long Term needs include continued funding for the Computer Replacement Plan and 1:1 Chromebook Program. A new phone system (as support will be ending soon for the current system), additional staffing, funding for the network infrastructure including switches, wireless controllers/access points and servers.
